Appearance	Dull black coloring of the body and head. Antennae are elbowed with usually 13 segments. Females are wingless, except for the queen			Yellowish or beige in color surrounded by a silken sac

Type of feeder (Chewing, sucking, etc.): Chewing

Host plant/s: Broadleaf and mixed forests, woodland trees, and wooden buildings. Feeding on plant juices, fungus, and other insects.

Description of Damage (larvae and adults): Cavities and tunnels in old rotting wood or sides of buildings, causing structural weakening of old trees and infestations of wood in homes.
