Type of feeder (Chewing, sucking, etc.): Piercing-Sucking

**Host plant/s:** Wild Strawberry, goldenrod, kentucky blue grass, alfalfa, wheat, oats, corn, switchgrass, smooth crab grass, and red clover.

**Description of Damage (larvae and adults):** Both nymphs and adults suck plant juices by means of their piercing-sucking mouthparts. This does not turn the plant yellow; instead it just stunts the plants

growth. In some cases resetting may occur. A severe infestation can drastically reduce the yields of crops.
