Common Name: Southern fire Ant

Scientific Name: *Solenopsis xyloni*

Order and Family: Hymenoptera: Formicidae

Size and Appearance: Worker

	Length (mm)	Appearance
Egg		White, very small and difficult to see, found generally only in underground nests unless the nest is disturbed.
Larva/Nymph		White, grub-like, found within the nest.
Adult	Workers: 3mm – 6.5mm	Amber, orange-red, or dark brown head and thorax, large eyes, abdomen is black with yellowgold hairs.
Pupa (if applicable)		White with black eye spots, darkening with age, resemble adults, found within the nest.

Type of feeder (Chewing, sucking, etc.): Chewing

Host plant/s: Citrus species, seeds, almonds, tree bark, honeydew.

Description of Damage (larvae and adults): Feed on flowers and destroy younger fruit. Can kill younger trees or harm older trees by eating too much bark/sap.
