Pest Profile



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Common Name: Brown Widow Spider

Scientific Name: Latrodectus geometricus (Fabricius)

Order and Family: Araneae: Theridiidae

Size and Appearance: *Latrodectus geometricus* spiders are fairly widespread in regions featuring a tropical climate. In the United States, most of the Southeast is home to the Brown Widow Spider. They differ from their well-known family member, the Black Widow, in having grayish-brown coloration, often with white markings on the abdomen. Like the Black Widow, females of the species exhibit an "hourglass" shaped marking on the underside of their abdomens, often yellowish-orange. Females are about 2 mm long and males are about 0.5-1 mm in length. Males are about the same shade as the female, but lack the signature "hourglass."

Type of feeder (Chewing, sucking, etc.): Chewing

Host/s or Prey: Araneiadae spp. feeds on small invertebrates.

Description of Damage (larvae and adults): Mainly a nuisance pest as it spins webs in undisturbed areas of yards, homes, sheds, and other structures. Though females are venomous, they are not as aggressive or likely to bite as other family representatives.
