Pest Profile

Common Name: Smoky Brown Cockroach

Scientific Name: *Periplaneta fuligionsa* (Serville)

Order and Family: Blattodea: Blattidae

Size and Appearance: Smoky brown roaches are about 25-38 mm long and shiny brownish-black in color. Both sexes of this species feature a full set of functioning wings and are strong fliers. Nymphs are black during the first instar, brown in 2^{nd} , and have a white marking on mesothorax. Later instars are reddish-brown in color. The oothecal (egg case) is dark brown to black with 10-14 eggs on each end.

Larva/Nymph	1-38 mm depending on instars	1 st instar black, 2 nd instar brown, both with white segment on mesothorax. Later instars are reddish-brown with rounded abdomen. 9-12 instars.
Adult	25-38 mm	Shiny brown-black in color with fully developed wings.
Pupa (if applicable)	N/A	

Type of feeder (Chewing, sucking, etc.): Chewing

Host product/s: Smoky brown roaches feed on a wide variety of food sources, particularly decaying matter.

Description of Damage (larvae and adults): Smoky brown roaches prefer to be in high humid areas and remain mainly outdoors. However, they will invade homes in search of moisture and nutrition where they become a nuisance pest.
